*A note to everyone:* At the September CAC meeting, Officer Upchurch encouraged all citizens to report crimes occurring in their neighborhoods. She also said that when we report a crime, the officer will ask many questions as he/she processes our information. When an officer contacts any person who reports a crime, he asks many questions in order to have all relevant information. Those questions include much information about the person reporting the crime. Such questions include: date of birth, Social Security number, employer, etc., as well as information about the crime itself. All this is necessary now for all of us, in part because some people have made false claims and wasted valuable police time (somewhat like having to give identification when writing a check because of the number of people who write bad checks). Information taken is kept in confidence.

The drop-off recycling center at Plaza West Shopping Center closed permanently on August 23, 2007. The center's property manager ended the agreement, and all of the recycling collection containers have been removed from the site off Jones Franklin Road. Raleigh residents and small business owners can continue to recycle at the remaining drop-off centers. All six centers accept all 14 materials that can be recycled curbside, and most of them also have containers for recycling cell phones and printer and toner cartridges.
