Have you ever wondered where your bottles and cans go after they leave your recycling bin? Are you curious why yard waste isn't allowed in your garbage cart? Learn the answers to these questions—and more—by watching "All about Solid Waste Services," a new program on the Raleigh Television Network! The video, produced by the City's Public Affairs Department in collaboration with Solid Waste Services, airs frequently on RTN Channel 11. Residents without Time Warner cable television can watch the program anytime using the RTNSV streaming video service available online. ### **Plaza West Recycling Drop-Off Center Closes for Good**

The drop-off recycling center at Plaza West Shopping Center closed permanently on August 23, 2007. The center's property manager ended the agreement, and all of the recycling collection containers have been removed from the site off Jones Franklin Road. Raleigh residents and small business owners can continue to recycle at the remaining drop-off centers. All six centers accept all 14 materials that can be recycled curbside, and most of them also have containers for recycling cell phones and printer and toner cartridges. ### 2008-09 Action Plan

The City of Raleigh will follow the adopted Citizen Participation Plan to complete the 2008-09 planning process. The Community Development Department (CD) will conduct several public meetings to access public and stakeholder input on housing and community development needs in Raleigh and comments on the draft Plan when it is developed. CD proposes to conduct a public meeting on **November 8, 2007** to get citizen input on needs and comment on the operation of existing programs. A public hearing will be held in April 2008 in the City Council Chambers.
